Quarterly Investment Review

PRODUCT OVERVIEW

The Fund seeks to generate total return.

The philosophy that underlies all of GMO's Asset Allocation investment strategies is the belief that, at times and in the short term, the pricing of asset classes can deviate from true intrinsic value, but mean reverts to appropriate valuation levels over the long term. Using GMO's 7-Year Asset Class Forecasts, the Fund seeks to allocate to areas of the global equity markets we believe are most attractively valued. Our approach combines the best of GMO's top-down Asset Allocation views and bottom-up equity research to identify mispricings at both the asset class and individual security levels. The Fund allocates to equity strategies that are actively managed by other GMO investment teams with expertise and experience in security selection within their respective markets.

MAJOR PERFORMANCE DRIVERS

- Top-down asset allocation was modestly negative. The headline positions of emphasizing developed ex-U.S. over U.S. equities, along with emphasizing value equities over growth equities, both worked poorly for the quarter. However, the overweight to emerging market equities was a strong contributor for the quarter.
- Security selection was strong for the quarter, driven by very positive outcomes in Europe and Japan.

Emerging market equities, with an emphasis on undervalued stocks, represented 17.2% of the total portfolio weight on average during the quarter. Our overweight position in emerging market equities had a positive impact on relative performance as MSCI Emerging Markets returned 24.0% in USD terms, far ahead of the MSCI ACWI return of 14.9%. Security selection was slightly negative, as the portfolio returned 23.3%. An overweight position in United Microelectronics (Taiwan Information Technology) featured in the top five biggest individual contributors to relative performance for the quarter, while an underweight position in SK Hynix (Korea Information Technology) appeared among the top five detractors.

U.S. equities accounted for 38.6% of the total portfolio on average through the quarter, comprising 29.7% in broad U.S. equities and the remainder in Quality equities. This leaves the portfolio 24.6% underweight U.S. equities in total, and this had a small negative impact on relative performance for the quarter as the MSCI USA Index returned 15.2%, just beating MSCI ACWI. Security selection in the U.S. was broadly flat as our U.S. portfolio returned 15.0% in aggregate. An overweight position in Lam Research (Information Technology) featured in the top five biggest individual contributors to relative performance for the quarter. On the flipside, underweight positions in Micron (Information Technology), Advanced Micro Devices (Information Technology), and Intel (Information Technology) featured among the top five biggest individual detractors from relative performance for the quarter.

Core European equities accounted for an average weight of 21.9% of the portfolio for the quarter, although the actual exposure is slightly higher than this, allowing for the domicile of some of the Quality holdings. Our overweight position in Europe had a negative impact on relative performance as the MSCI Europe Index returned 10.9%, well behind the MSCI ACWI return. Security selection within Europe was strong, however, and the portfolio returned 14.9%. An overweight position in Nokia (Finland Information Technology) featured in the top five biggest individual contributors at the total portfolio level.

Japanese equities accounted for 9.8% of the total portfolio on average through the quarter. This is a moderate overweight position against the benchmark and had a marginal negative impact on relative performance as MSCI Japan performed a little worse than MSCI ACWI, returning 14.2% for the quarter. However, our stock selection in Japan was very good relative to this, delivering a 17.1% return. An overweight position in Panasonic Holdings (Consumer Discretionary) and Murata Manufacturing (Information Technology) featured in the top five biggest individual contributors to relative performance for the quarter. An overweight position in Inpex (Energy) featured among the top five biggest individual detractors from relative performance for the quarter.

The portfolio held 9.6% on average in the remaining catch-all "other international." In aggregate, across allocation and stock selection, this had a modest negative impact on relative performance for the quarter.

Portfolio weights, as a percent of equity, for the positions mentioned were: United Microelectronics (0.5%), SK Hynix (0.7%), Lam Research (1.1%), Micron (0.0%), Advanced Micro Devices (0.0%), Intel (0.0%), Nokia (0.9%), Panasonic Holdings (1.0%), Murata Manufacturing (1.0%), and Inpex (0.8%).
