MAJOR PERFORMANCE DRIVERS

Equity markets were weak in the first quarter with MSCI World falling 3.6%. The portfolio lagged the broader markets, posting a negative total return for the quarter.

Two themes have significantly influenced equity markets this year. The first is the reality of a more muscular U.S. foreign policy stance as evidenced by operations in Venezuela and Iran, increasing geopolitical and economic tail risk. The second is rising concern over AI's potential to disrupt existing businesses and ongoing concerns about the Capex flows within the AI ecosystem.

Energy stocks were the stand-out beneficiaries of the first, the gyration in geopolitics, echoing the move in the oil price and beating the broader markets by an extraordinary 40 points over the quarter.

Other asset-heavy businesses thrived during the quarter as well. The Iran war, the HALO (heavy assets, low obsolescence) trade, and expectations earlier in the quarter for strong cyclical growth in 2026 all contributed to that market leadership, while the asset-light characteristics that typically define our investment universe were out of favor.

The second concern led to a splintering within the AI trade, with semiconductor supply-chain companies performing well while hyperscalers and software-related businesses came under pressure.

Continued policy risk around managed care, concerns tied to private credit, and weakness in luxury and travel after war in Iran added to the quarter's crosscurrents.

Within that environment, the long side of the portfolio returned -13.1% as long positions within Information Technology, Health Care, and Communication Services contributing the most to the negative returns. No sector exposures on the long side posted positive returns. Short positions in Financials, Information Technology, and Consumer Discretionary boosted returns for the portfolio. Overall, the short side gained about 5.8%. The long side averaged about 171% in exposure for the quarter, while the short side averaged about 71%.

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MAJOR PERFORMANCE DRIVERS CONT..

A continued shutdown of the Strait of Hormuz could conceivably lead to a broader economic downturn and potentially a stagflationary environment that could benefit Quality in relative terms. Conversely an easing of tensions would favor the sectors we do not currently own and that have recently outperformed. Within AI, we believe the market has sold off too broadly across companies where an AI disruption narrative can be constructed. We also believe the divergence between hyperscalers and semiconductors is overdone, since the same macro drivers support both categories.

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PRODUCT OVERVIEW

GMO's Focused Equity team believes that high quality companies have a sustainable competitive advantage that allows them to be excessively profitable for many years into the future, while low quality "junk" companies lack sustainable competitive advantages and generally have risky business models. The GMO Quality Spectrum Strategy contains a concentrated long book of high quality companies and levers the long portfolio by shorting a diverse portfolio of "junk" companies, with an emphasis on valuation. The Strategy expects to generate equity-like returns over time, with the long quality/short junk element designed to provide a bulwark against market drawdowns.
